### Revelation 1— Background to the Seven Churches in Revelation

# I. Who, What, Where, When, Why? (vv.1-4a, 9-11)

- a. Revelation= Unveiling—unveiling of Jesus Christ
- b. Author: John- possibly John the Apostle but not for certain
- c. He writes this while exiled on Patmos (persecuted because of word of God)—John was writing to believers who were experiencing persecution in the Roman empire; specifically the seven churches in Asia-Minor (Modern day Turkey)
- d. 3 Literary genres in one: apocalyptic; prophesy, and letter
- e. Main issue: how churches respond to the tension of living in the authority Roman Empire while staying faithful with Jesus Christ as their Lord

# II. Strange Greeting (vv. 4b-8)

- a. Seven spirits—likely symbolic reference to Holy Spirit
- b. Description of Jesus—faithful witness: same word as martyr (faithful unto death); firstborn from the dead- primogeniture—Jesus' position as heir- one who rules, as well as first to secure resurrection; ruler of the kings of the earth—reminder of who is in control, despite that it would seem Rome was ultimate ruler
- c. Description of his work on the cross and the church's role: freed us from our sins by his blood; made us into a kingdom and priests (*Exod. 19:6*) to serve his God and Father
- d. Written in a very worshipful, doxological way; filled with OT allusions

#### III. Not Your Normal Picture of Jesus! (vv. 7-8; 12-16)

- a. Coming on the clouds—allusion to *Daniel 7:13* (Jesus is fulfilling Daniel's prophesy)
- b. Dressed in robe; golden sash, feet like glowing bronze; sword out of mouth, etc.
- c. Portray the power and holiness of Christ (equal to the Father) who is judge of the churches

#### IV. The Unusual Exchange (vv.17-20)

- a. Fell at his feet; but told not to fear; There is something both terrifying and beautiful about Jesus in this from
- b. Command to write what he has seen...sets stage for message to 7 churches

#### V. So what?

- a. How do we as a church (and individuals within the church) relate to the powers that be in our modern context?
- b. Do we see Jesus as Lord of our church; is our primary motive to please him and be faithful?
- c. In the midst of an antagonistic world; we can find comfort that God is in control despite how the world may look; Worldly empires will rise and fall, but God's church will always remain
